Overall Objectives

- 3. Provide potential authors with an opportunity to engage with R&D Management editors to get understanding of the publication process and alignment of manuscripts with the journal's readership.
- 4. Establish a forum for editors to work with prospective authors on manuscripts that are in progress (working papers).
- 5. To develop new research ideas, agendas, and collaborations among scholars interested in R&D and innovation fields

The 2-day workshop will include both a scholarly and a social program, including a variety of sessions, as well as lunches, coffee breaks, and a joint workshop dinner and networking. 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Potential workshop topics

We are interested in research that broadens our understanding of the dynamism, change and application of R&D management in Oceania and beyond. The call for papers is open to a wide range of topics and methodological approaches including quantitative, qualitative, mixed-methods and case studies, as well as theoretical/conceptual papers. We highlight here potential topics of interest:

Digital technologies and data

- How are digital technologies transforming traditional R&D processes?
- How are organizations leveraging artificial intelligence and machine learning in their R&D and innovation activities?
- What role does big data play in driving innovation in various industries?
- How are decentralized systems, like blockchain, reshaping R&D management, innovation, and intellectual property?

Multilateral collaborations, ecosystems and platforms

- How do firms orchestrate multi-party innovation initiatives?
- How do ecosystems and platforms influence the dynamics of R&D collaborations?
- What are the key success factors for establishing and maintaining a thriving innovation ecosystem?
- How have digital platforms reshaped the landscape of R&D management?

Social and environmental sustainability

- How is the emphasis on sustainability and circularity influencing R&D agendas?
- What are the challenges and opportunities in integrating sustainability objectives into R&D projects?
- How are firms measuring the impact of their R&D efforts on social and environmental sustainability?

The next frontiers of Open Innovation (OI)

- What are the emerging models and practices in open innovation?
- How do firms balance the benefits and risks of open innovation?
- Are we moving from "traditional" OI paradigm towards open innovation ecosystems?

Ethics and transparency in innovation

- How are ethical considerations influencing the direction and scope of R&D projects?
- What mechanisms firms can use to ensure transparency in their innovation processes?
- How are ethical standards being challenges in the age of data-driven innovation?

R&D in the age of automation and robotics

- How is the rise of automation and robotics technologies influencing R&D strategies and investments?
- What are the implications of increased automation on the R&D workforce and skill requirements?
- How are organizations balancing the benefits of automation with potential societal impacts, such as job displacement?

Policy implications for global R&D collaborations

- How are international policies shaping cross-border R&D collaborations and partnerships?
- What challenges do firms face in navigating the complex web of international R&D regulations and policies?
- How can policymakers foster a conducive environment for global innovation collaborations?
- How do firms adapt their R&D strategies in response to global disruptions?

- To allow for effective idea and paper development, the number of participants will be limited to 40 authors. Participation in the workshop is dependent on a successful outline submission only, and only one author per submitted paper will be able to participate.
- We especially encourage junior faculty/postdocs, PhD students and authors who have not yet published in R&D Management to apply, although all applications are welcome.
- Inclusion decisions will focus on potential benefits for the author and the potential of the research to make significant theoretical and meaningful contributions to the field of R&D and innovation management.
- The submissions should be sent to krithika.randhawa@sydney.edu.au with copy to sie.admin@sydney.edu.au, with the subject line indicating "R&D Management Workshop". Please include the following (in **one single PDF file**):
 - Cover letter indicating your affiliation and contact information and the status of the paper (completed manuscript, additional data collection planned, etc.)
 - Full working paper (length can vary based on the level of maturity of the research – from an outline, to a paper draft, to a full paper)
- Submissions will undergo double-blind peer review.
- If your paper outline is accepted, you will be invited to present during the workshop.
